Pre-op blood test

You will need to have bloods taken within 72 hours of your surgery. The Hospital will send you a text message to remind you and you will also receive a call from the Midwife.

If these bloods are not taken, if may cause delays in your caesarean section or possibly, cancellation


Blood tests include: a Full blood count (FBC) and Blood Group (repeat for confirmation)

- Sips of water until 12:30pm

Please arrive to the <u>6th floor of North Wing Postnatal ward.</u> You can arrive with your birth partner / they can join you later and report to the reception.










The Elective Cesarean team

Although it feels like a lot of people, we all have a job to do in delivering your baby!






Cancellations and delays

- We order our list based on clinical priority
- We share theatres with the rest of the Maternity Unit.
- St Thomas' is an NHS tertiary unit and therefore we care for women and babies with complex needs. Sometimes, these cases need delivering on certain days to receive the appropriate care. This can lead to some other, more low risk caesareans being moved to an alternative date to facilitate this. This can occur last minute, sometimes even only 24 hours before the day itself.
- Emergency cases will take priority over the elective activity. Therefore, delays
 may occur while we care for these women. We ask that you please be patient and
 we will try and keep you updated as much as possible.
- On the rare occasion, we have to cancel your elective caesarean, we will invite you back for the next day.

Anaesthesia



- You'll be given the anaesthetic in the operating room. This will usually be a spinal or <u>epidural</u> <u>anaesthetic</u>, which numbs the lower part of your body while you remain awake.
- The lower part of your body will feel quite numb and your legs will go very heavy
- A urinary catheter will be inserted following this in order to keep your bladder empty.
- We check that the block is working with cold spray
- The operation will not be painful it may be uncomfortable at times as you can feel pushing and stretching even when the block is working well
- We will give you pain-killers after the surgery and the heaviness in your legs will wear off after about 4-6 hours

Delayed cord clamping is routinely done in theatre for 1-2 minutes except in cases where baby is compromised at birth

Skin to skin with your baby is encouraged



Recovery on the Postnatal Ward

Important things to remember for your recovery

- You can begin to walk around in the evening of your caesarean section. Mobilizing will help you recover quicker.
- Eat a light diet as from 4-6 hours after surgery (soup, fruit, salad, yoghurt ..)
- You can shower with your dressing on.
- You will also have the opportunity to attend a Parent education class @10 am everyday for infant feeding support & Discharge information

Baby checks on the Postnatal ward

- Examination of New born -NIPE (done by Specialist midwife or neonatologist)
- Hearing screen









Birthing Environments

One birth supporter in theatre

An additional supporter in recovery/high dependency areas

Postnatal Wards and Westminster Suite

Birth supporter can stay overnight

3m - 8pm two visitors at a time

Siblings of the baby accompanied by an adult



Discharge

- We aim for a 30 hour discharge once it is safe for both you and your baby to go home
- We are doing our very best to get you home as soon as we can, so please be patient and ask any questions if you need about your discharge!

We advise you to buy the below in advance and keep at home:

- A pack of paracetamol 500mg tablets
- A pack of Ibuprofen 200mg tablets
- These medications may be needed during your postnatal period.

Frequently Asked Questions



1. Q Will my baby(babies) stay with me all the time?

yes your baby(babies) stays with you at all times except in cases where they need to be admitted to NICU(neonatal intensive care unit) for clinical reasons

2. Q. What if my breast milk delays to flow after C/S?

you will produce colostrum in the first few days, mature milk may take longer to establish depending on the feeding history and we encourage skin to skin and breastfeeding after birth when your baby shows signs and hand express if needed.

3. Q. Is there hospital parking?

Parking costs £3.20 an hour, there are no maternity exemption passes. Parking outside the hospital area is very limited & sometimes impossible. We encourage considering other modes of transport to arrive for surgery due to possible long waiting times.

4. Q. What if I go into labour before my C/S day?

Please call or attend the maternity assessment unit (MAU) on 7th floor north wing. Their number: 02071881723- based on your condition you will have an emergency C/S

5. Q. I would like to change my C/S day who do I speak to?

You will need to speak to your doctor. Contact your midwifery team to arrange this on your behalf via their email address.

6. Q. Can I book a private room?

Yes, but postnatally these are first come first serve.

Westminster Maternity Suite- cost £950 per night.

Please telephone Westminster **02071883019** at **9am on the day of your surgery** for requests. If you cannot be accommodated one day, you can request again the next day.
